Recipe of the Month

Roast pork with apple, mustard, a honey cream sauce, and baked apples

Marinade:

1 tbsp honey (the thinner the better)

2 tbsp coarse-grain mustard

2 tbsp apple brandy

Pork:

3 ½ lbs loin of pork

2 tbsp unsalted butter

Coarse salt

Baked Apples:

6 large Pippin apples, cored but not peeled

Cinnamon and sugar mixture to taste

Sauce

½ c hard cider or non-alcoholic cider

½ c chicken stock

Reserved marinade

2 tbsp crème fraiche or heavy cream

In a small bowl, mix together the honey, mustard, and apple brandy. Brush over the loin of pork and leave covered in the refrigerator for 24 hours. After marinating, pour off the marinade and reserve the sauce.

Preheat the oven to 350°. Pat the loin of pork dry. Then score all over with knife.

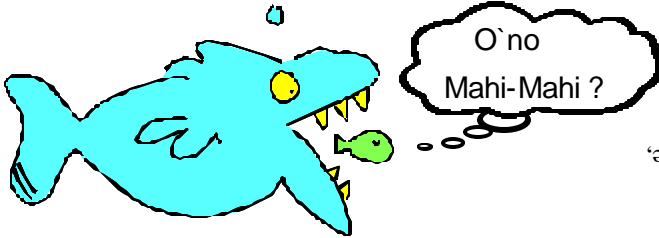
Rub butter onto the loin and sprinkle with the coarse salt. Place the loin on a rack pan to catch juices and roast for 2 hours.

Meanwhile, season the apples to taste with sugar and cinnamon. Make a shallow cut through the skin all around the apple, about 1/3 of the way down. Place the apples into a round cake tin or dish and baste with some of the fat from the pork. Cook on a lower shelf in the oven for the last 30 to 45 minutes of the cooking time for the pork. Remove the pork from the oven when cooked. Keep warm. Stir the cider into the meat juices on the stovetop. Boil for 2 minutes. Stir in the chicken stock with the reserved marinade and boil for 3 more minutes, stirring frequently, scraping up the pan drippings. Add the crème fraiche and stir over the heat for 2 more minutes. Strain into a sauce boat or server.

Arrange the apples around the pork and serve accompanied by the sauce. Yield 6 servings. Wine suggestion: Reisling.
